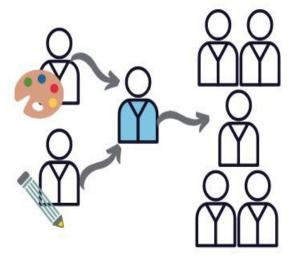

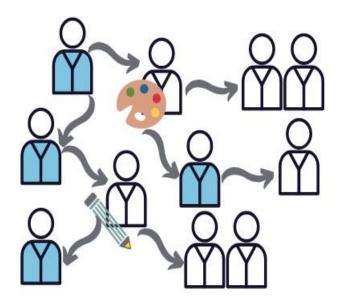

Methods

- Online survey
- Creative intermediaries in 3
 African cities: Cape Town,
 Nairobi and Lagos
- Quantitative + qualitative
- Part of a wider project on creative intermediaries in three African countries (Kenya, Nigeria and South Africa)

Lagos 32 respondents; Cape Town 25 respondents; Nairobi 28 respondents

Analysis of...

- type of organisations and individuals
- types of support they provide to the sector
- Agenda for the sector
- How they connect with each other and to the sector more broadly
- Challenges they face
- Role of policy (actual and potential)

Who are creative intermediaries in Africa?

- The title of 'creative intermediary' applies to a range of organisations and individuals with a range of business models, including individual freelancers, large public sector organisations and informal community networks.
- In countries with different cultural policy frameworks such as Nigeria and South Africa there might be an emphasis on certain business model or opportunities

What do creative intermediaries do?

Most intermediaries acted in at least two of these provisions - multiple roles and positionalities

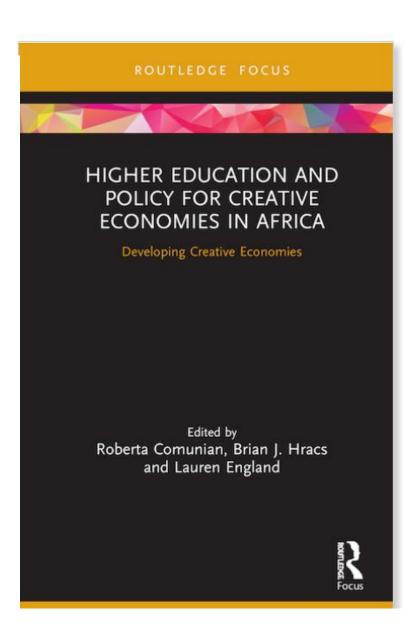
Conclusions



- 1. Many challenges shared in relation to lack of policy engagement and recognition towards the sector and its importance but also the sector inability to share common goals and come together for a shared agenda.
- 2. Need for a better understanding of the role that creative intermediaries can play in the development of creative economies in Africa and around the world.
- 3. More research needed to provide a more detailed picture of how these actors operate in relation to policy and development agendas —especially in relation to access and equality
